		The 2018 Network Diagram of Madison County, which was provided by AT&T, reflects that there are 15 PSAPs. The diagram includes the following PSAPs and does not include MADCOM as a PSAP:

		MADCOM is an unmanned emergency roll-over/backup PSAP and training facility. MADCOM does not receive 9-1-1 calls as an initial answering location. This information was confirmed with the 9-1-1 Coordinator, Dana Burris. Therefore, the correct number of PSAPS subject to consolidation in Madison County is 15 not 16. The number of PSAPS required to close or decommission is 8, and MADCOM cannot be counted toward that number.
Revised Network Diagram and call handling agreements	Yes ⊠ No □	All documents were provided; however, there were several call handling agreements that were not compliant with 83 III. Adm. Code Part 1324, Section 1324.200, 3). This section requires the remaining PSAPs in a consolidated system to directly dispatch all emergency calls. The specific agreements not in compliance are listed below in the conclusions.

Conclusions:

The Emergency Telephone System Act (ETSA) [50 ILCS 750], Section15.4a, (4) states, in any county with a population of less than 250,000 that has a single Emergency Telephone System Board or qualified governmental entity and more than 2 PSAPs, the 9-1-1 Authority shall reduce the number of PSAPs by at least 50% or to 2 PSAPs, whichever is greater. The Madison County Consolidation Plan does not meet the technical requirements for consolidation set forth in ETSA or the Illinois Admin Code.

Specifically, the plan has two technical flaws:

 MADCOM is not a PSAP as defined by 83 III Adm. Code Part 1324, which defines PSAP to mean "the initial answering location of an emergency call." An unmanned backup is defined as "a public safety answering point that serves as an alternate to the PSAP for enhanced systems and is at a different location and operates independently from the PSAP. A back up PSAP may accept overflow calls from the PSAP or be activated in the event that the PSAP is disabled." Based upon a review of the information provided by Madison County and confirmed by the 9-1-1 Coordinator, MADCOM is an unmanned backup.

Therefore, Madison County's 9-1-1 Authority consists of 15 PSAPs rather than 16 which agrees with the network diagram provided by AT&T. Accordingly, Madison County cannot count the decommissioning of MADCOM toward its required PSAP consolidations. As previously stated, the ETSA requires the 9-1-1 Authority to reduce the number of PSAPS by at least 50%. Since the total number of PSAPs is 15, Madison County is required to consolidate a total of 8 PSAPs in order to meet the requirement in Section 15.4a (4) of the ETSA; however, Madison County has only proposed to consolidate 7 PSAPs. Accordingly, it will need to consolidate an additional PSAP - Alton Police Dept., Collinsville Police Dept., Edwardsville Police Dept., Glen Carbon Police Dept., Granite City Police Dept., Madison County Sheriff Dept., Pontoon Beach Police Dept., or Wood River Police Dept.

- 2. Further, 83 III. Adm. Code 1324, Section 1324.200, 3) specifically states that, "*The authorized PSAPs remaining after consolidation shall directly dispatch all emergency calls and shall not transfer or relay those calls to an unauthorized entity.*" The following call handling agreements are in conflict with this rule.
 - Call handling agreement between Madison County Sheriff PSAP and the St. Jacob Police Department indicates the primary dispatch method is a transfer to a telephone number rather than direct dispatch.
 - Call handling agreement between Madison County ETSB and Troy EMS indicates that the primary dispatch method "Troy" and the secondary method as "Madison County". A specific method (i.e. radio frequency, etc.) must be identified for the primary and secondary method. The primary method must be a form of direct dispatch and not a telephone number which results in a transfer.
